Enjoy the Brush parade; I will be at Imperial session. While at Imperial, your Iowa Corporation representatives will be voting on many proposed amendments and resolutions. The one that affects us all is a change to Article II section 211.5 Per Capita Tax. If passed, 2022 per capita will increase by \$20 to \$50 per member. The deficit caused by decreasing membership is the reason for the increase. This amendment will probably pass. There are also other proposed changes that will reduce costs. These initiatives are being proposed to help ensure the longevity of Shriners International.





Up in old Arvada (not too far from where Arvada Lodge used to be) is a peaceful garden replete with tables, chairs, umbrellas, and a beautiful brick patio surrounded by trees and bushes and secreting those who are enjoying the sanctity of such an idyllic courtyard. Thursdays are special – the whole family drops by for a tip of the bottle (which have become known as "martini Thursdays" by the family and other attendees) although it's most likely better than an even bet they come to enjoy just being together. It is an enviable custom and one which Lanna and Gary Gosage certainly deserve.

Born in Wichita, KS on 4 November 1942, Gary claims to be an Anglo-American with a touch of Kentuckian thrown in. His family moved to Arvada in 1945. He graduated Arvada High in 1961 and matriculated to Ft. Lewis. Somehow, in the midst of all this college stuff, he married his High School sweetheart Lanna in 1963. He was not all that happy there in Ft. Lewis as it seems as how he really wanted to enter law enforcement. While working in a 7-11 (ya gotta feed the family somehow) he heard there were openings in the Academy over here on the eastern slope. So he went home that night, loaded up his new bride, and drove over the hump to come home. (He later finished his degree in Sociology and Psychology at Regis University.) He and Lanna are the proud parents of Ron (wearing blue in Boulder) and Amie (running an upscale western wear business in Arvada - need good boots or maybe a Stetson?). They also dote on five grandchildren – Lexie, Sidney, Preston, Jack, and Ashton.

Gary was a Denver cop for 26 years, retiring as Tom Coogan's Deputy Chief of Police. (That was in the days when there was only one "deputy chief," not like later when each district had one.) One of his fellow officers, with whom he worked closely, was Ill Sir Jim "Fitz" Fitzpatrick. Each was the other's "right hand man," depending on whom you asked. He was very active, belonging to the Jesters and the Sandblasters, and rode a Harley in the Motor Cycles. While in this Harley unit, Gary was charged with a motorcycle raffle for a few years which was, of course, successful. He and Lanna are now snowbirds, spending winters in Yuma, AZ where he is a member of the Foothills Shrine Club.

Gary was the second Mason in his family; a great-uncle was the other. He also belongs to the Royal Order of Moose. He counts his family as his proudest accomplishment. The friendships, brotherhood, and longevity in Masonry are important legacies and he hopes that he has set a good example for his children. That is a safe bet, for having met the family, they are all upstanding members of society. Son Ron is a Watch Commander in Boulder, carrying on the family tradition.

Now that he has a little spare time, he has become quite an accomplished artist, working in pastels and oils in a studio in the basement of the afore-mentioned idyllic house. He even submits his work to an annual (twelve years now!) show in the fall.

Optars members present at the meeting on May 3rd decided on going dark in the summer months (June, July, and August), but possibly on having a mid-summer photoshoot.



33EL JEBEL HELPS WELCOME HOME VETERANS ON AN HONOR FLIGHT ~ kb

For many years, the Pipe Band has been involved with the Honor Flights out of Denver. For those who may not be familiar with these flights, they are an all-expense-paid (albeit short) trip to Washington, DC for our nation's heroes. There are two such organizations operating in the area: Rocky Mountain Honor Flight which concentrates on veterans from the immediate Denver area, and High Plains Honor Flight that takes those from northern Colorado, and sometimes Wyoming and western Nebraska. (When it was first formed, it was known as Northern Colorado Honor Flight.) While both endeavor to honor those who have served our country, there are a few minor differences.

High Plains generally leaves on a Sunday morning in mid-May from one of the FBOs (fixed base operator) at DIA known as Signature Flight Services. They charter a plane (usually a Boeing 737) and fly at least once a year. They bus their "guests" down from an assembly point in Ft. Collins, and return them to the same place upon their return. They have a great send-off, with fire trucks flying banners from their ladders, motorcycle escorts (some of which have been Patriot Guard riders from as far away as Texas) who ride with the caravan from Ft. Collins to DIA and back, and crowds lining the overpasses on I-25. However, this trip is only thirty-six hours. Even though they see Arlington, the various war and service memorials, and are given the opportunity to stop at any if requested, theirs in not as "in-depth" as the other Honor Flight. High Plains usually returns early Monday evening and the Band plays for them as they exit the building and get on the buses. (We used to play for their departure, but the organizers felt that was too intrusive on their "last minute instructions," and we switched to the returns.) The Covid incident of 2019 shut both flights down until this spring (2022).

Rocky Mountain Honor Flight leaves early on Thursday mornings out of DIA proper on regularly scheduled Southwest flights. They take fifty-five as that is the number of passenger seats on the tour bus in Washington. The last four years (not counting 2019 - 2021) there were four such flights – one in mid-May, one in mid-June, one the weekend following Labor Day, and the last one of the year in mid-October. These flights spend two and a half days in Washington and the buses stop at every memorial where the veterans are given the opportunity to walk around and get "upclose and personal" with the crowd, the memorial, and each other. (Should the vet not want to get off, he can stay on the bus.) The Band forms up at the top of the escalators and elevators where passengers come up from the trains to welcome them home. We even welcomed some Flights in combination with the AFA Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps (the acoustics are marvelous) and literally stopped traffic in the terminal. (One of these can be viewed on YouTube; it lasted over an hour!) The epitome of "wow-ing the crowd"!

Spouses and family members are discouraged from going along on these trips as it is felt such would impede "closure." Both flights have a doctor, nurse, and those who act as "guardians" for the veterans. These guardians pay

their own way at the present rate of one thousand dollars each for the first two such Flights; but if they help out by going on more than two, subsequent Flights are "only" five hundred bucks a crack. If a veteran is confined to a wheelchair or is otherwise impaired mobilitywise, these guardians are one-on-one with "their" vet, including being roommates. For those veterans for whom mobility is not an issue, two vets "buddy-up" as roommates as do the guardians, with one guardian "assigned" to two vets. Included in this "closure" trip are a luncheon one week prior (to ensure all are instructed to take necessary meds and what to pack), go over the schedule, distribute caps and shirts to commemorate the event, answer questions, and assure family members their veteran will be well cared-for. They stay at a hotel that is specifically for Honor Flights. The locals who patronize the hotel bar make sure no vet goes away thirsty nor pays for a drink. In short, they are treated as the celebrities and heroes they are.

It was once again our honor to welcome home the veterans on three of these Honor Flights in May and June! The number of WWII heroes is sadly decreasing, so both Flights are now taking Korean and Viet Nam vets, based on availability but concentrating on those from WWII. (Sometimes High Plains will take Purple Heart recipients, again based on space available.) The Rocky Mountain Flight in June had one of El Jebel's own on it – Danny Tomlinson of the Legion of Honor. On a past Flight, Legion of Honor Commander Ed Richards was an honored guest for his service in Korea.

To raise the money for these Rocky Mountain Honor Flights, 9News is once again holding a Telethon on Thursday, 7 July 2022 from 0500 (that's five am for some) until 1900 that evening (seven pm). We will be there answering the phones, so be sure to look in and give us a call. The next Flights are scheduled for early September and mid-October. We would welcome anyone who would wish to come out to welcome these heroes home from these Flights in the future. If it were not for them, you would not have the freedom to read this missive, and certainly not read it in English. RV ROAMERS SUMMER BEGINS BY: TONY DATTILO, P.P.

Before the "Global Warming" frenzy started, the RV Roamers started their "Outings" at campgrounds fairly close by to the majority of members in the Denver Metro Area. Usually, either Cherry Creek or Chatfield Lakes RV camping facilities were chosen. These first of the year outings are utilized as "shakedown" cruises for the "rigs" that have been in storage all winter long, and discovery of non-working features of systems and facilities that worked fine the previous year told the tale of "cold" storage effects.

In April, the weather patterns began to include water from the sky, either in the soft liquid or the colder "whitewater" type, accompanied by temperatures that caused furnaces to ignite to create warmth for the rigs' owners as they remained within their confines for the duration of the "Outing". First outings were moved to May and the cold, wet, whitewater droppings followed – again, making life uncomfortable for the inhabitants of the mobile getaway vehicles of various types – and again, the initial "shakedown" outings were moved to June.

The "Shakedown" Outing for this June was held at the Colorado City KOA Campgrounds, several miles south of Pueblo. A nice area with plenty of natural territory surrounding the well-maintained grounds.

The "Global Warming" thing came around with the usual temperatures experienced during this month for a few thousand years — warm, windy and breaking the three-figure temperature reading for one day.

The heat and gasoline price escalations didn't seem to deter travelers on Interstate 25 which has been given a major facelift between Colorado Springs and Denver. That type of work is now ongoing in the area south of Colorado Springs through the winding course of I-25 in the Pueblo area. Scott Cromwell and his Lady Jannice were very gracious in accepting the role "Wagonmaster" for this outing, and did a marvelous job in creating an interesting agenda which included a trek to Pueblo to visit their Medal of Honor Memorial Heroes Plaza at the Pueblo Convention Center. This plaza features statuaries of Congressional Medal of Honor (CMH) recipients who lived in Pueblo, a town which has the highest number of recipients per capita than any other town in the country. Also featured is a wall of black granite in which the name of every CMH recipient is engraved, beginning with the era of the Civil War and continuing through sections reserved for the wars following in which American soldiers served with such dedication and incredible valor that caused their recognition and award of the Congressional Medal of Honor. For this soldier, it was a humbling experience to stand in the presence of their memory.

Close by, is Pueblo's Riverwalk, a rather new and beautiful feature that winds its way through Old Town Pueblo, and includes various representations of persons and places of historic and modern America, well done by artisans who are gifted with the ability to mimic humanity with bronze. The former Pueblo Police Department building

was vacated about ten years ago and now serves as an indoor/outdoor restaurant and brew pub that features some delicious and irresistible food and adult beverages.

The Roamers present were fewer than normal for an "outing". We had 4½ couples present consisting of Scott and Jannice Cromwell, Jimmy and Sherri Marshall, Ken Stauffer and Bonnie Custer, Tony and Ellen Dattilo and Roamers President, Jim Stewart – the ½ couple as Jim's lady Annette was unable to attend due to her commitment to attend the Daughters of the Nile Supreme Queen's gathering in Dallas Texas. Her presence was missed, but we struggled through (as did Jim and Coco the Stewarts' Spaniel) without her. We learned that the Daughters of the Nile made their Dallas gathering very worthwhile for Shriners as they presented the Imperial Potentate of Shriners International with a check for two million (yes that's \$2,000,000.00) dollars for the furtherance of the mission of Shriners Childrens' clinics and hospitals.

Finally, back to our "Shakedown" cruise results. The following reinforces my mantra regarding the two classifications of RV owners, "Those who have troubles, and those who will." With the five rigs that presented at Colorado City, we witnessed a dead battery on a towed car, a leaking toilet, motorized motorhome steps that needed repair, an internal water filter that leaked, a refrigerator that didn't get cold, a sun cracked tire that needed to be replaced, and a leaky sewer hose connection. Most of these issues were corrected, thanks to the able and expert assistance of our Treasurer, Jimmy Marshall and a local RV service man who is an expert and well sought-after RV repairman who spends his days in, under, on top of and underneath the various Recreational Vehicles throughout southern Colorado – a very busy guy – especially this time of year.

Camaraderie, good times, good food and drink overcame the troubles of the day, and by the end of this weekend of true "global warming", sights, sounds, friendship and brotherhood prevailed.

Next month, a "regular" outing at the Mountaindale RV resort near Penrose and Canon City. If this sounds like something you might be interested in, you are most welcome to come and join us for one of our activities. You don't need to own an RV to be a member of the Roamers. We find campgrounds that incorporate some very nice cabins in their parks which is an option for the RV-less..

Until next time, be well, "entertain" yourself with the inflation circus that we're witnessing, and Keep the Faith.. This too shall pass – it always has, and things get better when it does. Blessings and best wishes to all for a happy and safe summer.


Our Summer Function "Fiesta" will be held at Highlands Masonic Temple on Wednesday, July 27th, where our new Supreme Appointees will be introduced.


