



Well, here we are in Mississippi, with the *Red Fez* due in the morning! So, to come up with something about photography, we'll tell you about how we fix pictures, even at a distance.

Jim takes most of the photos, now – he is steadier. But since he only has one good central vision eye, most of them need straightening.

Our first procedure is to take the memory card out of the camera and stick it in the laptop, then move the pictures to a new or existing category (we have all of our pictures from 2004 to now, and can find them in the categorized terabyte storage). After straightening them, the lighting is usually changed – brightened or darkened. Each location we take pictures in has a different light – incandescent, fluorescent, outdoor, flash, and or just poor lighting. Rather than change the camera settings each time, we do it quickly on the computer. Also, to keep lampshades, fire extinguishers, or bathroom signs from sticking out from someone's head, we clone out obstructions.

If there is time, pictures are titled and names of people are attached. Then, if necessary, they are cropped. Each picture is changed in some way to keep track of any that are missed, by having it say "Save." We then upload them onto "Google Photos," sometimes rearranging them; we title the album and get a new link to be able to send them. Jim has several lists of people to send to, mostly in blind copy, to keep us from sharing e-mails with all the scammers. Our goal is to share as many memories with others as we can, so when "old age" creeps up, we will all remember our first trip to Englewood!

THE (ORIGINAL) DROVERS ~ STEVEN STEVENS

Brother Oliver Loving was one of the very first cowboys elected to the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma for pioneering the cattle drives from Texas to supply meat to the western United States, along with his good friend Brother Charles Goodnight. Together they blazed the historic Goodnight-Loving trail, one of the primary cattle drive trails of the late 1800's and early 1900's.


Brother Loving was born in 1812 in Kentucky and moved his family to Texas in 1843. He eventually settled in Palo Pinto County, where he owned a 1,000-acre cattle ranch. In 1857 he sent his nineteen-year-old son to take cattle up the Shawnee trail and deliver them to Chicago. In 1860, Loving made his first trip across the Red River into Oklahoma where he followed the Arkansas River into Colorado and watered the herd near Pueblo. During this trip, the Civil War broke out. Loving, being from Texas, was detained by Union troops before he could return. His good friend Kit Carson, a Mason from New Mexico, stepped in to get him released. It's not documented but you can imagine some brotherly love and friendship between the two.

In 1866, Brothers Loving and Goodnight learned about where the US government had settled about 8,000 Navaho on a reservation near Fort Sumner and their need for meat. They made their first trip from Texas westward into New Mexico. There, they sold the US fort a herd of steers for \$12,000 in gold. However, the US did not want the breeder cattle so Brother Loving moved them northward while Brother Goodnight returned to Texas for another herd of steers. Brother Loving took the cattle all the way to Cheyenne, Wyoming where longhorn cattle herds were established and still exist to this day.

During a drive to Fort Sumner in 1867, Brother Loving with his scout Bill Wilson ahead of Brother Goodnight headed to contract for bids on the herd. Going into an area well-known as Comanche territory, Loving didn't heed the warnings to travel only at night and was seriously wounded in the arm at what is now known as Loving Bend on the Pecos River. He and Bill made it back to Fort Sumner where his wound became gangrenous, and he died. Prior to his death, he asked Goodnight to make sure he was buried in Texas, should anything happen to him. After being initially buried at Fort Sumner, Goodnight, along with Loving's sons, fulfilled their promise and returned Loving's body to Texas where he now lies at Greenwood Cemetery in Weatherford, Texas, where he received a Masonic funeral with honors. This is the truest display of brotherly love!

Both Loving and Goodnight were members of Phoenix Lodge No. 275 located in Weatherford, Texas. They will stand forever as original Drovers and Masonic brothers. (See photo on opposite page)

Park just west of Loveland on U.S. Highway 34, the gateway to Rocky Mountain National Park. The Big Thompson River creates the setting for this park, and this area didn't disappoint in 2023 for bringing unusual "surprises" to our attendees. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday brought some unusually tardy cool temperatures and "healthy" thunderstorms, followed by what appeared to be a belated annual cottonwood tree forest's "purge" of "cotton" resembling a "fuzzy" ground-covering snowstorm that invaded drink cups, table tops, RV awnings, and anything else in the vicinity, including attempting to breathe with the telltale "tickle" felt in cranial "openings".
